Despite heavy rain, around 1,400 walkers turned out in force on Saturday night to back the Peace Hospice's Starlight Walk. Walkers turned out determined to have fun and many were dressed for the occasion. If there was an award for the most amounts of pink fabric, glitter and laughter in one place, Starlight Walk 2012 would probably win that honour too! The event which began at the Colosseum in Watford looks set to raise around £130,000 and is likely to take the overall amount of money raised through the Starlight Walk to over £1 million.

Walkers also enjoyed a big build up from Peace Hospice Patron, actor and musician Martin Kemp, before the Starlight Walkers poured through the Colosseum doors and into the night. Martin is an avid supporter of the Peace Hospice and his presence was a highlight for many excited walkers. He explained: 'My wife Shirley and I lost all our parents within a few years, so I can imagine how much it means to people to have the support of the Hospice at the worst time in their lives'. The Peace Hospice plays a really important part in our community and it is events like the Starlight Walk which make all the difference to its funding. Walkers had a choice this year of tackling a six or thirteen mile route with the walk kicking off at the earlier time of 10pm, but many of the event's favourite elements have remained the same. Friendly Marshals, frequent snacks and fun are all consistent ingredients in making the Starlight Walk a magical experience to be part of. As the early hours of the morning approached, Starlight Walkers began returning to the Colosseum after their final candlelit steps through the serenity of Cassiobury Park. The satisfaction of a personal goal being achieved, perhaps mingled with thoughts of loved ones lost to a terminal illness. The Peace Hospice simply couldn't continue to provide its services, for free, without everyone's support.


### Community Bus Service to Watford from Byewaters

### LONDON 2 PARIS CYCLE RIDE



The third week of July saw more than one peloton heading for Paris and the climax of the Tour de France. Mine left the O2 in Greenwich and the start of four days of good company and 300 miles of testing cycling in beautiful countryside in Kent and France. The climax was bringing central Paris to a standstill riding in a peloton of nearly 200 riders around the Arc de Triomphe, down the Champs Elysees, onto the Place de la Concorde and on to the Eiffel Tower

finish. It was a very emotional end to a fantastic experience. The first day of 85 miles was very tough with brutal climbs in the last 30 miles into Dover, far worse than any in our nearby Chilterns or Thames Valley. Once in France we experienced the way the French respect cyclists as all drivers gave us room and did not pressurise us to get out of the way - Brits please take note! Calais to Arras to Compiègne and finally Paris. Cycling through the WW1 battlefields was very moving, where we stopped at the huge Thiepval memorial to the missing and then a more personal visit to the memorial to my grandfather's Royal Scots battalion in the village of Contalmaison. Thinking of the huge sacrifices made by so many certainly spurred me on when I found the cycling getting tough. Amazingly my legs got stronger as the week went on. And then on to Sunday to watch Wiggo become the first Brit to win the Tour de France... more emotion as he led out Cavendish to the stage win. Central Paris was a sea of Union Jacks and Norwegians, Dutch and even the French were cheering this landmark British win. A brilliant end to a never to be forgotten week. And to date we have raised over £460,000 for Action Medical Research.



### Please Help Your Fellow Neighbours

Can we please consider others when parking and driving around Byewaters. Do not obstruct the pavements for pedestrians and reduce speed when driving here.

### SHOP 'TIL YOU DROP - A NEW MORRISONS?

There is strong support among residents for a new Morrisons supermarket in West Watford, according to a survey carried out by the company. The supermarket tested local opinion about its plans to regenerate the Royal Mail depot site on Ascot Road in June with a consultation event giving residents a chance to check and comment on the proposals. These include new houses, a hotel and a new primary school. Morrisons said the results from the forms showed 96 per cent of those who completed the feedback form supported there being a new supermarket at this site with 84 per cent in favour of a new school. More than 220 residents visited the exhibition to see the details first-hand on June 15 and 16. Morrisons secured a long lease from Watford Borough Council earlier this year and announced its plans for the new development in May. The supermarket says that, if approved, the new store will create around 300 new jobs in the area. The company is now working with Watford Borough Council on a planning application which is expected to be submitted this summer

## Byewater Birds Part 10

Living next to a Site of Special Scientific Interest and sandwiched between the River Gade and the Grand Union Canal provides local residents of Byewaters with some of the best bird watching opportunities in the area. As summer draws to a close we look at some regular visitors to the gardens and open spaces of Byewaters.

### Grey wagtail (*Motacilla cinerea*)

The grey wagtail is a more colourful bird than its name suggest and is actually a yellow colour (although not to be confused with the yellow wagtail, a migrant from Africa). They can often be seen bobbing around the pavements of Byewaters and feeding on insects beside the canal. Just like the pied wagtail (also seen frequently around the estate), the grey wagtail has become more numerous in recent years.



### Great spotted woodpecker (*Dendrocopos major*)

Another frequent visitor to Byewaters is the great spotted woodpecker. This large bird is often seen hanging on to the trunks of trees feeding on beetle grubs, but they are also regular visitors to birdfeeders where they have a passion for peanuts. Easy to identify with distinctive black, white and red colouration, but it can also be identified from its characteristic 'drumming' display.

### Wren (*Troglodytes troglodytes*)

The wren or Jenny wren is one of our smallest birds weighing just 8-13g (our smallest bird is the goldcrest). Wrens are unusual in that they rarely fly any great distance - feeding mainly from the ground and crevices (the Latin name troglodytes means cave dweller). Perhaps surprisingly, the wren is Britain's most common bird with over 8.5 million breeding pairs. Maybe this is why it has found its way into the British psyche and is the only bird to have appeared on a British coin (the farthing).



### Kestrel (*Falco tinnunculus*)



Although not a common sight here, kestrels do regularly hunt over the moor and will dive onto prey such as mice, voles and grass snakes in gardens and open spaces around Byewaters. Sometimes seen perching in trees along the canal, these wonderful birds are on the decline nationally.

## NEW ROAD AND MADAME TUSSAUD

Did you know that New Road was originally a cow path between the Red House and The Artichoke on the Green. For over 200 years there were shops such as Wheelwrights and blacksmiths. Few of the older shops survive, there was also a slaughter house and butchers shop (1930s) the last resting place for cattle being driven down the lane from the Green. Victorian houses can still be seen in the road. At the bottom of the road is No. 17, The Hawthorns. This house has links to Marie Grosholtz, born in 1761 who married Francois Tussaud in 1794, and set up a wax masks museum in Paris and then opened a similar museum in London 1835. John Theodore Tussaud, her great grandson lived at The Hawthorns, his name is in the street directory of 1916, 1919 & 1926. He welcomed famous people to The Hawthorns and modelled waxwork images of them in a studio at the side of the house. He wrote a book about his great-grandmother entitled The Romance of Madame Tussaud. She had lived in Paris (40 yrs) during turbulent times. She then relocated to London where she lived for 50 years. 'So that her biography may be said to comprise a tale of two cities'. She was buried in the catacombs of St. Mary's



Church, Cadogan Place, Chelsea. Although her marriage does not appear to have been a happy one, she kept her married name. She had two sons by Francois, Joseph and Francis. Francis was the grandfather of John Theodore and he was born in Kensington on 2nd May 1858 and like his father Joseph (the son of Francis), exhibited at the Royal Academy. Marie Tussaud died on 15th April 1850 she passed peacefully away at her house attached to the Exhibition in Baker Street. The last words Marie Tussaud spoke in this world were characteristic of this wonderful woman's indomitable spirit. Calling her sons to her bedside, she gently upbraided them for showing distress at her departure, rather than gratitude that she had been spared to them so long. Her farewell exhortation was, "I divide my property equally between you, and implore you, above all things, never to quarrel." I don't know if John Theodore's book is still in print but you can read it online <http://www.ebooksread.com/authors-eng/john-theodore-tussaud/the-romance-of-madame-tussauds-ala/1-the-romance-of-madame-tussauds-ala.shtml> a very interesting read and with a link to New Road.


